### **2005 Prendo Pinot Grigio, Alto Adige - Regularly \$11.99**

Wilhelm Walch Winery has been producing Pinot Grigio since 1869 when the winery was founded. Located in the prized region of Alto Adige, this winery has a historical stone cellar that houses their famous detailed oak casks, hand-carved in 1880. Aged in stainless steel, this wine goes through partial malolactic fermentation which creates layers of fruit with a delightfully fresh, crisp long finish. Enjoy this wine with fish, cheese, or just on it's own!

### **2005 Carr Napa Sauvignon Blanc, California – Regularly \$15.99**

Joseph Carr, a Cape Cod native, is a negotiant. That means he does not own a vineyard or winery – he sources his grapes from others. He has been in the wine industry for many years and has maintained friendships with some of Napa Valley's best growers. These growers now supply the grapes for his wines. His Cabernet Sauvignon has been a popular wine for many of you so now we introduce his Sauvignon Blanc. It is lush and tropical

### **2004 Grant Burge (Unwooded) Barossa Chardonnay, Australia – Regularly \$10.99**

Grant Burge is a fifth generation winemaker absolutely committed to the Barossa Valley. All of Grant Burge red wines are produced at the Illaparra Winery, which Grant purchased in 1993; white wines are vinified at his Barossa Vines Winery purchased in 1999. His Miamba Shiraz has been a "People's Choice" for over a year, so we decided to introduce one of his whites. This unoaked Chardonnay has delicious varietal peach and melon aromas, along with rich buttery notes. Bright acidity balances the fullness of the wine and brings a flavor of lingering, ripe peaches and green apples.

### **2004 Dry Creek Russian River Chardonnay, California – Regularly \$16.99**

David S. Stare of Boston went to France in 1960 where he fell in love with wines of the Loire Valley. He first planned to start his winery there but the wine industry was booming in California so he felt it was a better opportunity. In 1972 he opened his winery in the center of Dry Creek, the first since prohibition, which started the long list of "firsts" he is credited with. His Sauvignon Blanc vineyards were the first planted in Dry Creek. He was the first to designate "old vines" Zinfandel on labels. He also was a leader in the efforts to recognize Dry Creek Valley as an AVA. The Russian River Chardonnay is a blend of 25 different lots which are harvested and vinified separately. The 2004 Chardonnay shows brilliant golden color, with rich pear aromas and a stony character on the finish. All of the Dry Creek wines receive numerous awards every year so if you like their Chardonnay, try one of the other varietals.
